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NEW SHELTER KITCHEN COMPLETE

The *Buck Up Bucks County* campaign asked residents to donate a dollar each so the Bucks County Emergency Homeless Shelter could get a desperately needed kitchen renovation. The community responded with over \$200,000 in just 27 days!

Buck Up Bucks County launched on February 3, 2013 and, with a great deal of help from the Courier Times, The Intelligencer and Comcast, was quickly a success. Online donations immediately poured in and, a few days after the launch, a pile of mail at least a foot high arrived with donations of varying amounts totaling thousands of dollars. Many included heartfelt notes of care, support and encouragement for both the campaign and shelter residents.

In the weeks that followed, thousands of individuals, families, ser-

vice organizations, local businesses, schools, athletic teams, faith-based organizations, government officials and non-profits joined the fundraising effort. *Buck Up Bucks County* canisters made their way into hundreds of local businesses, and on March 1st, just 27 days after launch, our \$200,000 goal was met.

The Renovation

On June 5th, with architectural drawings complete, contractors lined up and a temporary modular kitchen parked behind the shelter, demolition began. Just 56 days later, construction

was finished. The project included a complete overhaul of the kitchen, food storage area, laundry facility and loading dock. The newly-improved kitchen now features a walk-in refrigerator, a more efficient preparation area, a cooling system and brand-new appliances, lighting, shelving, flooring and much more. Overall, the new kitch-

en is safer and more efficient, and it will continue to be the source of three meals per day for 75-80 residents. Staff and volunteers gathered for a ribbon cutting (pictured on front) on August 7th, and meal preparation in the new kitchen began that evening.

The success of the fundraising campaign and construction are a

direct result of having the right people involved. It was a "perfect storm." The grand total donated was \$282,000. 100% of the money raised went directly to the project. Donations above and beyond \$200,000 enabled us to renovate twice the amount of space as originally planned. The community's response, as well as the efficiency and success of *Buck Up Bucks County*, was unprecedented.

Volunteers Needed for Contact Helpline

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, "every 15 minutes, someone dies by suicide in this country. For every person who dies, there are many more who think about, plan or attempt suicide." Fortunately, suicide is preventable. With the increase in reports of suicide in our community, the need for trained volunteers also increases. You can help prevent suicide by becoming a volunteer. Phone rooms are located in Bucks and Montgomery counties, and volunteers must be able to commit to a minimum of four 4-hour shifts per month.

I am happy to announce that the Boards of Directors of CONTACT of Greater Philadelphia and Family Service completed a merger in May 2013. As a result, we now operate the CONTACT Helpline, Reassurance program and Children of Aging Parents.

Newly Acquired Programs

Trained CONTACT Helpline volunteers provide objective, confidential and anonymous telephone-based warm line, information, referral and suicide prevention services. Reassurance volunteers make daily calls to socially isolated older adults living alone. Children of Aging Parents provides information, referrals and support for caregivers of the elderly or chronically ill.



that everyone in our community is interconnected and that we need to work together for the greater good," said Jamie Haddon, President & Chief Executive Officer at United Way of Bucks County. "Two of our strongest member agencies merging improves service, creates efficiencies in the system, and ensures that our response to individuals and families in crisis is more effective than ever." Together, we will continue to serve those facing a crisis in their lives and support the independence of older adults.

Reports of suicide have increased across Pennsylvania over the last decade. The Bucks County Coroner's Office reported 81 suicides in 2012, up from 66 in 2006. Similarly, the Montgomery County Coroner's Office reported 93 suicides in 2012, up from 69 in 2006.



The Merger

There are many reasons for a merger between non-profit agencies, such as quality improvements in existing services, expansion by linking related services, improved efficiency through better utilization of assets and reduced overhead, increased funding through expanded fundraising capabilities and new relationships, enhanced market visibility, or any combination of these factors.

A transition team reached out to long-time CONTACT volunteers and partners, and we have begun to include their valuable knowledge and experience in our plan to strengthen current operations. We have already initiated enhanced training and supervision, and discussions are underway regarding the use of new technologies and how to best integrate the resources of our Outpatient Behavioral Health, Older Adult and Volunteer programs to enrich CONTACT Helpline offerings.

AUTISM PROGRAM EXPANDS

Autism Awareness, Community Education and Support (AACES) services are now more accessible to families in central and upper Bucks County

AACES, a program for young adults with high-functioning Autism (i.e. Asperger Syndrome), provides job training and preparation, socialization opportunities and parent support in order to increase independence and decrease isolation among young people with an Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). Previously available only in Langhorne, we have expanded these services to our Doylestown location so they are more accessible to families in the central and upper parts of Bucks County.

We recently launched a parent support group in Doylestown to provide support and information to family members of young adults with high-functioning Autism. This group meets on a monthly basis and is always open to new members.

In addition, we will launch a weekly "Coffeehouse" program later this month at our office in Doylestown. The Coffeehouse model, which we currently operate in Langhorne, focuses on helping participants learn or improve socialization and life skills. With the right support, many of our participants are capable of going to college or vocational training, getting a job and becoming more independent.
