Family Builder of the Year

Since Foundations Community Partnership (FCP) formed in 2007, it has supported numerous vital programs that meet the behavioral health and human service needs of children and young adults. FCP promotes higher education through scholarships and internships and encourages professional excellence through a workshop series that brings experts to Bucks County to share their knowledge and experiences with local providers. FCP was selected as our Family Builder of the Year because it has been a key partner in the development of our school-based counseling and therapy program, our Autism program and the expansion of our licensed mental health program in Quakertown.

Family of the Year

Each year we recognize one family who came to us with challenges and

made a strong commitment to overcoming those challenges through treatment and support.

Edward Dixon came to our agency in January 2010 battling alcoholism, depression, anxiety and Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. He wanted to put his life back in order and realized that he needed safe and supportive housing to begin his journey. Edward applied for and was accepted to Bucks Villa, our group home for individuals who are HIV positive or living with AIDS. He quickly became a leader among his peers, and with support from medical case management and counseling, he was successful. Edward took an active role in his recovery and is now a peer educator, traveling throughout Bucks County to share his story and help others.

Keynote Speaker

A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

While we have grown substantially over the years, our mission today remains the same as it was when we first opened our doors back in 1953.

The Beginning

Sixty years ago, in February 1953, a small group of Bucks County residents met to discuss ways to meet the urgent, constantly growing need for a family service agency. At this meeting, a steering committee was selected, and after much hard work, Family Service Association of Bucks County was formed. In October 1953 we opened our doors to clients. During those first three years, our organization served nearly one thousand families with a wide range of emotional needs.

In her address at our first Annual Meeting, Lela C. Durand, former Executive Director of Family Service, referred to our organization as "a service designed for and used by the people of Bucks County." Though the community's needs and therefore our agency's services have greatly expanded over time, today, sixty years later, Mrs. Durand's description of Family Service is still accurate.

Sixty Years Strong

We are sixty years strong. Our organization continues to succeed because of our unique ability to identify and meet critical community needs through effective, efficient, evidence-based programs and services. When people come to us with a need, our response has always been and will continue to be: "We can help." We do so through our services or via a referral to the appropriate outside resource when necessary. The needs of the community evolve over time, and our organization is responsive to these ever-changing needs. We grow alongside our community members who rely on us day in and day out for help, guidance and support.

Then and Now

In 1953, our annual budget was \$21,000. Funding came entirely from the United Community Fund, which later became United Way of Bucks County. During our first year, three caseworkers managed 104 cases. This past year, we strengthened the lives of 9,052 individuals.

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION

In January, we will launch a Nurturing Parenting Program designed to build nurturing skills as alternatives to negative parenting attitudes and practices.

Nurturing Parenting Program (NPP) provides families with opportunities to attend classes in the home or in a group setting with other families. Parents and children meet separately and jointly during a ninety-minute lesson once a week for fifteen weeks. These programs were developed to help families who are at high risk for abuse and neglect or who have been identified by child welfare agencies for past child abuse or neglect.

Program Goals

The goals of NPP are to increase parents' sense of self-worth, personal empowerment, empathy, bonding and attachment; to increase the use of alternative strategies to harsh and abusive disciplinary practices; to increase parents' knowledge of ageappropriate developmental expectations; to reduce abuse and neglect rates; and to reduce or eliminate the need for future intervention.

How it Works

By participating in discussion, roleplay, and communication exercises,



participants learn how to nurture themselves as individuals and in turn build their nurturing family and parenting skills as dads, moms, sons and daughters. Participants develop their awareness, knowledge and skills in five areas: age-appropriate expectations; empathy, bonding, and attachment; nonviolent nurturing discipline; self-awareness and self-worth; and empowerment, autonomy and healthy independence.

4 WAYS WE CAN HELP

Below are four eye-opening statistics regarding prominent issues in our community. Each quarter, we will explore one of these issues and share how we can help.



88% of adults age 65+ want to stay in their homes as they age.



Suicide is the second leading cause of death for 25-34 year olds. Suicide is preventable.

Every 9 1/2 minutes, someone becomes infected with HIV.

Most studies indicate that 75-85% of adults with Asperger Syndrome do not hold a full-time job.

2. WE CAN HELP PREVENT SUICIDE

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, suicide is the second leading cause of death for 25-34 year olds.

At our Annual Meeting, Dr. Gerald Reed, recognized leader in the national suicide prevention movement, spoke about his efforts to raise awareness about the issue of suicide and to effect public policy changes in mental health legislation.

In his remarks, he noted that our Suicide Prevention Steering Committee, headed by Commissioner Diane Marseglia, is a necessary step for suicide prevention in Bucks County.

This Steering Committee was formed in June to help shape, inform and enhance community-wide suicide prevention efforts. We invited community members who have suffered the loss of a family member as a result of suicide to participate. The response was significant. More than twenty people are actively attending and participating in monthly meetings. In addition to the Steering Committee, another prevention effort is our CONTACT Helpline. The Helpline provides free, confidential telephone services to individuals who are contemplating suicide, struggling with life's challenges or in need of someone to listen.

Calls are answered twenty four hours a day, 365 days a year, by staff and volunteers who are specially trained in active listening skills and strategies for supporting people under emotional stress.
