Annette Coletta had an estab-lished clientele at her Zen Den café, tucked back into a cozy location behind State Street in

location behind State Street in Doylestown.

But she wanted better visibil-ity for the restaurant, so when Shaving Grace at 41 East State St. closed down, she jumped at the chance to relocate a half block

It's made a world of difference. Since she opened the new cafe on Nov. 3, she has more room and new customers are finding what has been described as a "funky, chic coffee boutique."

"We more than doubled our work area," she said, including building a full kitchen to turn the site into a restaurant. She and her staff also revamped the menu. "We added more health-conscious and vegan options," she said.

Especially popular is the avocado toast, a vegan combination of sliced avocado on crusty bread

of sliced avocado on crusty bread with olive oil, salt and pepper. "We go through six cases of avocados a week," she said, because customers like it so much. Other breakfast options include a breakfast burrito, power wrap, egg sandwich, oatmeal and a sunrise bowl of bacon, avocado, hard-boiled egg, quinoa and roasted tomatos.

A top seller from the lunch menu is the Buddha bowl, which inella is the Buddina bowl, which is a plate filled with crispy roast-ed chickpeas, avocado, quinoa, mixed greens and housemade red pepper sauce. Soups and quiches are made daily, and for meat eaters there is a chicken curry wrap

and cappuccinos, Coletta offers espressos, pour overs, Ameri-canas, and Vietnamese coffees. Special coffee flavors are dis-played on a board near the front of the restaurant and include flavors such as campfire mocha, Mayan mocha, Nutella mocha and Sicilian Kiss Tea drinkers can opt for chai

Tea drinkers can opt for chail attes or organic black, green or herbal teas in a variety of flavors. Cold drinks include coffee, iced tea, lemonade, chai, cider, smoothies and frappes.

The new version of the Zen Den has the same collection of small tables and clusters of cozy sofas and chairs, and is decorated with recycled materials. The décor includes oversized flowers painted at strategic spots on the walls. at strategic spots on the walls. Live music is performed Friday through Sunday nights. Despite the new location and

expanded menu, Coletta said the café is the same comfortable, funky place it has been for the past seven years. "It's just a different setting."

Family Service opens two units at homeless shelter

Family Service recently opened two new family units at the Bucks County Emergency Homeless Shelter, thanks to a \$150,000 do-nation from the Matthew P. Pel-legrino II Memorial Foundation and support from Bristol Town-shin

ship.
Family Service is a nonprofit organization that serves more than 26,000 people in need each year. It offers a variety of programs and services including emergency housing, suicide prevention, parent education, recovery support, counseling, job coaching and more. Family Service also operates the Bucks County Emergency Homeless Shelter, a temporary residence for individuals and families who have lost safe and families who have lost safe

and stable housing.

The funds from the Foundation named after the late Matthew P. Pellegrino II covered the cost of materials and other supplies for the new family units at the Bucks

Last year, Franco D'Andrea, a close friend of the Pellegrinos and an ongoing shelter supporter, suggested the project to the family and they immediately accepted the recommendation to support Family Service and the Bucks

In addition to funding the proj-In addition to funding the project, the Pellegrino family formed a team of approximately 100 volunteers to build the shelter's new family units. D'Andrea, who had led the teams for renovations to the shelter's kitchen and bath-

rooms over the past few years, served as the project manager. The two new units each consist of a sleeping area large enough for four people, and a family-sized bathroom. These additions allow the shelter house up to an additional 10 people at a time. Residents of the new units can include two-parent families with children, and family groups for whom the dormitory-style housing is not appropriate or does not work well, such as a father with a young daughter, a mother

with teenage sons, or a person with physical disabilities requir-ing handicapped-accessible re-

ing handicapped-accessible re-strooms.
